KNOWING YOUR WATERSHEDS

A watershed is an area of land that drains to the same place. Just as several leaves attach to one twig on one branch of one limb on a tree, watersheds are nested within one another. Large watersheds are made up of many smaller watersheds.

THE **BUILDING BLOCKS** OF YOUR **COMMUNITY**

Watersheds are the natural infrastructure that everything else is built on. They also point to how well lands function where we live, work, and play. When watersheds thrive, communities face fewer risks. A healthy watershed is a watershed with clean water, includes natural areas to support wildlife, and handles large rainfall events. Healthy watersheds also provide numerous services at a fraction of the cost it would take expensive new infrastructure to do the same thing. They are the cheapest, best way to build a thriving community. However, climate change directly impacts the health of watersheds. Warmer temperatures and variable precipitation can directly affect the availability and distribution of water.

These amounts can be highly sensitive to many factors, such as climate change Natural areas slow the flows of these resources, so we get their benefits without the headaches.
